5/5 (Sun.) - Congregational Town Hall Meeting with our Session after worship The choir anthems today are all taken from the Psalms, the hymnal of the Bible and cover a wide range of emotions. **"Create in me a clean heart, O God"** is sung during Lent as we ask for forgiveness and a new start in our lives. **"Lift Up the Gates Eternal"** is heard during Advent and on Palm Sunday. The tempo becomes faster and faster with the anticipation of the approaching Messiah. **Psalm 23** is perhaps the best known and most beloved of all the Psalms. It is a source of both comfort and hope. **Psalm 150** is the last of the Psalms as well as the last we will sing today. It exhorts us to praise God, including a list of instruments: psaltery, harp, trumpet, stringed instruments, organ and cymbals.

May these Psalms continue to speak to us in a new way today.

"Go into the arts. I'm not kidding. The arts are not a way to make a living. They are a very human way of making life more bearable. 

"Three Pieces for Organ" Frank Bridge (1879-1941) Movement #2- Adagio in E Major Written: 1905 English Composer, Violinist, Conductor, Instructor He studied at the Royal College of Music in London England, 1899-1903. Instructor for the composer Benjamin Britten. Prof. Bridge was a strong pacifist, deeply disturbed by WWI. He wrote several pastoral/ elegiac pieces in search of spiritual consolation. He was not an organist, nor associated with the music of the English Church, his short

pieces for organ have been among the most performed of all his musical output. (Source: Wikipedia). Notice that Bridge's "Three Pieces For Organ" was written only 2 years after completing his training at the Royal College of Music in 1903. I studied this piece as a beginning Master's Student in Organ Performance at UMKC's Conservatory in Music in Kansas City at the age of 28. It moved me then but not as much as it moves me in my spirit yet still today. The "Adagio" continues to be one of my favorite pieces to play. Its score looks easy, but in reality, it isn't. Sometimes in life, the simple/the easy at first sight turns out to not be so, another paradox, as life is. Rev. Norlita Kaul

Theme: Abide In Me as I Abide In You

Heidi Haverkamp in the Connections Commentary Series Devotional, there's the reminder as focus in the use of the verb in Greek, "Meno" or "to abide." She writes, "the vine grower needs to vine to produce as it is meant to do. Metaphors of Vines in Israel's Scriptures convey God's love and deep care, to ensure fruitfulness, connectivity, unity and judgment." There is a "mystical" component in the images of Jesus as "true vine," and the disciples as "the branches." This is the reminder of the "mystical union" the believer is to have with God. This is very important in John's community at the time the Gospel was written. There isn't any distinction then between "the vine," and "the branches," all are to be "one." This reminds us of this "union," to be "one with God," spiritually speaking in our lives. God is the Vine Owner/Grower, Jesus is the Vine, We are the Branches.

In English 2 words come into interplay here, "abide," or "remain." Both are found in various translations of this passage. However look closely and there's a difference of intention of what's being asked of us, as Jesus asked his disciples to do.

Abide- To live/stay somewhere. (verb) when used without an object in the sentence means to "dwell," have one's abode," "reside." Synonyms= tarry, live, endure, persevere. (Cambridge Dictionary)

Remain-To stay in the same place or in the same condition. (Cambridge Dictionary).


Rev. Chelsea Harmon in her commentary writes, "Meno" in Greek, "to remain" or "abide." The former carries the tone of a command. Jesus uses the word to describe a "mutual being together." (Another way of thinking of this is the "mystical union," described above. Harmon goes on to write, "our abiding/remaining in God is different than the way God abides/remains with us. (I'll add-"in us'). Branches come and go, get pruned or completely removed in any season. The Living Vine always remains. From the vine that gives, the branches grow and produce. This passage focuses on what can happen in our life with Christ, our discipleship." Great stuff isn't this!

In the Connections Devotional is found a "Further Connection," by the late Archbishop Rev. Dr. Desmond Tutu (1931-2021) from his writing, "God Is Not A Christian: and Other Provocations." He writes, "In the African worldview, in this we have "ubuntu." In Xhosa is said, "Umntu ngumtu ngabantu." It is very difficult to render in English. We could translate it, "a person is a person through other persons." We need other human beings for us to learn "how" to be human, for none of us comes fully formed into the world. For us, a solitary human being as a contradiction in terms. Ubuntu is the essence of being human. It speaks of "how" my humanity is caught up and bound up inextricably with yours."

This circles us back to the Hebrew concept as word, "Shalom." Whose meaning I remind us, is "in seeking the welfare of another human being, my own well being also has welfare." Jesus'; statement to "abide in Me," draws us into the reminder in our lives, that it's all about relationships, yours, mine, ours, with each other, with Jesus, and with our God. Refer to John's Prologue to this Gospel, Ch. 1:1-18, "in the beginning was the word....and the word was with God and came into this world... "pitching a tent," (Skeine in Greek) means "indwelling, abiding in, mystical union," with humanity, through Jesus Christ our Lord and Savior. My hope and prayer is that spiritually speaking we, as the body of Christ called FPC Bridgeton, become a congregation of intentionality and growth, in our "abiding" in our Triune God at a deep spiritual level.
