

Deacons will provide snacks for Fellowship Time after the service.




'That's a real coincidence', observed the Frenchman', My daughter was born on Valentine's Day, so we decided to call her Valentine.'



February Revelings

In the season of Advent, in our worship services weekly, we celebrated the coming of Christ's Light into our world, with our Advent wreath's lighting a candle each Sunday. In ancient days, it was a way of marking time to remind the people of the significance of the coming of the Christ Child into our world, spiritually bringing us out of darkness into the Light of God's love.

On Christmas Eve we celebrated the birth of our Savior, the Lord Jesus, and the Christ candle was lit on our Advent Wreath. In the season after Epiphany, the Christ candle has remained lit, during our worship services reminding us that the Light of Christ remains with us and still shines brightly in our world.

A busy month is upon us indeed this year! We'll celebrate with our Scout Troops, "Scout Sunday" on Sunday Feb. 4th. Then for the second Sunday, Feb.11th, we'll observe the last Sunday of our Epiphany season, with **Transfiguration Sunday.** (See below).



Transfiguration-1 : a change in form or appearance : METAMOR-PHOSIS, an exalting, glorifying, or spiritual change 2 capitalized : a Christian feast that commemorates the transfiguration of Christ on a mountaintop in the presence of three disciples and that is observed on August 6 in the Roman Catholic and some Eastern churches and on the Sunday before Lent in most Protestant churches.

Then after 3 days (sound familiar?) we'll be starting the Season of Lent, on Ash Wednesday, Feb. 14th (also Valentines Day). Again we'll celebrate the significance of this day with remembering our finitude with the distribution of Ashes. Again we'll celebrate this with our neighboring Greenwich Presbyterian (PCUSA) Church, who have graciously agreed to host the event this year. (See information elsewhere in our newsletter).

During the **season of Lent**, we will have a "Lenten Wreath," for our worship services. Every week we'll be reminded of the gift of Christ's Light for our world, what this means and to us individually. One by one, just as the candles were lit, one per week for our Advent Wreath, during the season of Lent, we'll begin to snuff out a candle per week. This is to remind us of the spiritual meaning for God's Love as Light helping to brighten the darkness in the world, and how much the world's evil as a vapor, strives still, to try to overcome this light, trying to snuff it out completely.



On Maundy Thursday, after we commemorate the "Last Supper of our Lord" with his disciples, by the end of the worship service, the Christ candle is snuffed out, to symbolize Jesus being put to death on the cross. Death tries to have the last word, so does evil.

Spiritually as reminder, for 3 days we recall how lost in the darkness we can be, just as the first disciples felt helpless without their teacher, master and friend, alone, perhaps hopeless at times. The shadow of death's darkness envelops us, we realize just how much the Light of God's Love, found in Jesus our Lord means to us too, still 2024 years later!

I hope this helps us to realize why we've been keeping the Christ candle around, lit and going during our worship services, as well as the spiritual significance it symbolizes to/for us.



Now for a wee bit about St. Valentine in Celtic Christianity

Valentine served as a Roman Catholic priest, during the 3rd Century AD. He suffered a Christian Martyr's fate, after spending time in prison, being put to death thereafter, on February 14th. It was rumored that Valentine had helped to heal his jailer's blind daughter, (following in the footsteps of the Apostle Paul, who did likewise during his imprisonment, befriending his jailer etc.). Within the Roman Catholic church tradition, Valentine was given the distinction of "sainthood," something not easily granted/ achieved in this tradition. Valentine became as an example/symbol of what Christian love and devotion is about, just as Jesus our Lord did, during his earthly life.

As Christianity began spreading throughout the Roman Empire, as the official religion of it, we know that Christianity made its way to the Celtic Peoples and lands, as far north as England, Wales, Scotland and Ireland. These Celtic peoples began integrating their own religious traditions, symbols and festivals into and with the traditions, practices, observances of Christianity. This was it was celebrated in the Roman Catholic Church tradition at this time.



(A Celtic Weaving represents the Holy Trinity, infinity, beginning and ending, inseparable).

The Celts during this time in history celebrated, "Lupercalia" on February 15th. It was a pagan festival honoring the opposite of what "Valentine" preached, practiced and taught. This was a celebration of

animal sacrifice, blood and violent celebrations, in and with the hope to keep evil spirits, as well as infertility away, and at bay.

Now we come to Ash Wednesday.

What Do the Ashes Signify? (from <u>https://www.learnreligions.com/</u>)

"During Ash Wednesday mass or services, a minister distributes ashes by lightly rubbing the shape of a cross with ashes onto the foreheads of worshipers. The tradition of tracing a cross on the forehead is meant to identify the faithful with Jesus Christ.

Ashes are a symbol of death in the Bible. God formed humans out of dust:

Then the Lord God formed the man from the dust of the ground. He breathed the breath of life into the man's nostrils, and the man became a living person. (Genesis 2:7, Human beings return to dust and ashes when they die:

"By the sweat of your brow will you have food to eat until you return to the ground from which you were made. For you were made from dust, and to dust you will return." (Genesis 3:19, NLT)

Speaking of his human mortality in Genesis 18:27, Abraham told God, "I am nothing but dust and ashes." The prophet Jeremiah described death as a "valley of dead bones and ashes" in Jeremiah 31:40. So, the ashes used on Ash Wednesday symbolize death.

Many times in Scripture, the practice of repentance is also associated with ashes. In Daniel 9:3, the prophet Daniel clothed himself in sackcloth and sprinkled himself in ashes as he pleaded with God in prayer and fasting. In Job 42:6, Job said to the Lord, "I take back everything I said, and I sit in dust and ashes to show my repentance. "When Jesus saw towns full of people reject salvation even after he'd performed so many of his miracles there, he denounced them for not repenting:

"What sorrow awaits you, Korazin and Bethsaida! For if the miracles I did in you had been done in wicked Tyre and Sidon, their people would have repented of their sins long ago, clothing themselves in burlap and throwing ashes on their heads to show their remorse." (Matthew 11:21)

Thus, ashes on Ash Wednesday at the start of the Lenten season represent our repentance from sin and Jesus Christ's sacrificial death to set us free from sin and death. "

I have found very interesting the perspectives of the Christian Theologian, Marcus Borg, who can be considered "controversial" by some, and a "breath of fresh air," by others. Borg has been an author of 2 books as "bible studies," that I've read, participated in and even led. These are "The Last Week" (Lent, dealing with the events/scriptures surrounding the last week of Jesus' life and death), and "The First Week" (Advent, dealing with the events/scriptures surrounding the surrounding the birth of Jesus into our world). Very insightful these perspectives have been.

Borg wrote and article "Ash Wednesday: Death and Repentance" on March 1, 2014. (<u>http://www.patheos.com/blogs/marcusborg/20q4/03/ash-wednesday-death-and</u> repentance)

Here's some of what he wrote, " Death is one of the primary themes of Lent. Each of us will die. None of us gets out of here alive. My wife has talked about the difference between Mardi Gras and Ash Wednesday. During the former, we indulge, party, cavort, and sometimes even wear masks. (Sound a little familiar to the aforementioned Celtic festival?). At the latter, we take off our masks as we are reminded of-indeed confronted with-the fact that we are dust. (Many of us don't want to think about this, much less reflect on it, spiritually speaking.)

A second primary theme of Lent is repentance, commonly understood to mean, repenting of our sins. The reality of death and the need for repentance, they go hand-in-hand for many Christians, especially those who believe in a post- death judgment and separation into heaven or hell or purgatory. (Roman Catholic Christian Faith Belief). None of us knows when we will die. Thus it is wise, prudent, and necessary to repent. Death and post-mortem judgment might be near.

Imagine the many centuries in which our spiritual ancestors took it for granted that heaven and hell, perhaps purgatory (in my family's Roman Catholic faith history this was so), were real. Imagine what death and the imperative to repent would have meant. They were ominous, threatening, fearful. It's important to be right with God when we die-for we risk divine, and maybe eternal punishment. (I once feared this, but now I know better and especially as a Presbyterian Pastor, believe whole heartedly in the love of God and do not fear the separation of/ from God. My salvation is sure, and for this I give God many thanks and all the glory! How about you?). "

Borg goes on writing, "I grew up with that understanding, (divine/eternal punishment), even as I did not grow up in a hellfire and brimstone churches. The threat of hell was not emphasized. But it was clear to me, Christianity was about going to heaven, and thus avoiding the alternative of postmortem divine punishment.

Death and repentance as themes of Ash Wednesday and Lent, now mean something very different to me. I no longer think that the heart of Christianity is about our eternal fate in heaven or hell or purgatory...yet I also affirm that the themes of death and repentance are central to Ash Wednesday, Lent, Holy Week, and Christianity. But they are not about where we will spend eternity, but about our lives here and now. And if some want to say, "why is that an either-or? How about both-and?" I am willing to say, "Fine-so long as we don't ignore the here and now."

Borg finishes by stating, "Ash Wednesday, Lent, Holy Week and Christianity itself are about following Jesus on the path that leads through death to resurrection. They are about dying and rising with Christ. We are to follow him to Jerusalem, the place of death and resurrection. That is what the journey of Lent is about.

That journey intrinsically involves repentance. But repentance is not primarily about feeling guilty about our sins, or about doing penance, think of the common practice of giving up something during Lent-whether meat or chocolate or alcohol or shopping and so forth. (Since becoming a PCUSA Presbyterian Pastor, I've long been about the notion of "giving away" something during Lent as a spiritual discipline and sign of God's love in our lives.)

The biblical meanings of repenting are primarily twofold. On the one hand, it means to "return to God, to reconnect with God." On the other hand, it means, "to go beyond the mind that we have," minds shaped by our socialization and enculturation. The result: dying to an old way of seeing and being and living and identity, and being born, raised, into a new way of seeing and being and living and identity. Ash Wednesday, as we are marked for death, is the annual ritual enactment of the beginning of that journey."

(These last 3 years since my late spouse's passing to Covid, I began realizing, that Ash Wednesday is about our own finitude and mortality yes, but it was more. Hence the reason why for these last 3 years and until my retirement as a pastor, whenever I distribute ashes to my congregants, I offer these words, "From dust you have come, and into eternal life, you shall go." It reminds us not only of our finitude, but it also offers us the hope we need on this earthly journey we are on, step by step, day by day. It offers us life as gift, eternal life everlasting, from our gracious and loving Triune God, who always wants the best for us, of us and in us.).

How fitting it is therefore that we celebrate both Valentine's Day and Ash Wednesday on the very same day this year. The reminder of God's ever present and ongoing love as well as the reminder as Presbyterians we ascribe to, "we are not our own, in life and in death, we belong to God." Have a meaningful February dear friends!

A time to meditate . . .

February Scripture Verses and Thoughts to Ponder

February, a month often associated with love and winter's grip, holds significance in the Bible as well. It is within this month that we find verses brimming with wisdom, faith, and reflections on life's journey. As we explore these unique verses, discovering the lessons and inspiration that February brings, we begin uncovering the deeper meanings behind this seemingly ordinary month.

Feb. 1: Psalm 37:5 "Commit your way to the Lord, trust also in Him, and He shall bring it to pass." Amidst the challenges and uncertainties of February, this verse reminds us to commit our plans, desires, and paths to the Lord. When we trust in Him wholeheart-edly, He promises to bring our endeavors to fruition according to His perfect will.

Feb.2: Proverbs 3:5-6 "Trust in the Lord with all your heart, and lean not on your own understanding; in all your ways acknowledge Him, and He shall direct your paths." As we navigate through February, it's crucial to lean on the wisdom and guidance of the Lord rather than relying solely on our own understanding. Feb. 6: 1 Corinthians 16:14

"Let all that you do be done with love."

In February, a month associated with love, this verse serves as a reminder to approach all our actions with love. Feb. 7: Ephesians 4:32 "And be kind to one another, tenderhearted, forgiving one another, even as God in Christ forgave you." When we align our hearts with His will and seek Him above all else, He promises to grant us the true desires that align with His purpose for our lives.

By placing God first, we can trust Him to provide for our needs and bless us abundantly according to His wisdom.

Feb. 13: Psalm 119:105 "Your word is a lamp to my feet and a light to my path."
